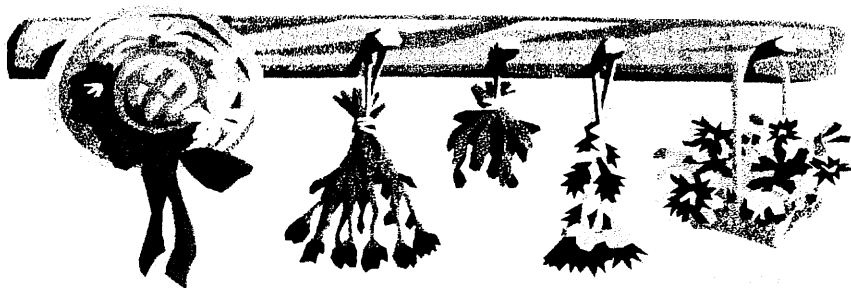

Women of Grundy County: Mary Elizabeth "Mollie" Brown Conry

Mary Elizabeth "Mollie" Brown was born to Rev. Aaron Norris B. and Martha Josephine Johnson Brown on the 4th of October, 1871 in Grundy County, Tennessee. On the 16th of August, 1891 she was united in marriage to John Conry by her Grandfather, Rev. William Sanford Brown. John Conry was born April 1870 in Tennessee to Daniel and Francis Keeling Conry. After their marriage, John and his father-in-law Norris B., built a log cabin on Hobbs Hill where they lived all their lives. To this marriage were born four children: an infant born and died 1891; Hester born 25th July 1892 and died 9th November 1898 ;an infant son born 3rd February 1896 and died 4th February 1896 and Lyster Bernard born 23 September 1899 and died in 1953.

John and Mollie were with the Fairmount Female College in Monteagle, Grundy County, Tennessee, until 1917. The school closed then with the onset of World War I.

Mollie died on the 7th of March 1960 and John died in 1950 and they are both buried in the Hobbs Hill Cemetery.

Mollie Brown Conry was an accomplished writer of poetry and artist. She was loved by all who knew her.

I was born near your banks, waded in your shallows, fished in your deep holes, took canoe rides on your surface and waded or walked the stepping stones daily to and from school.

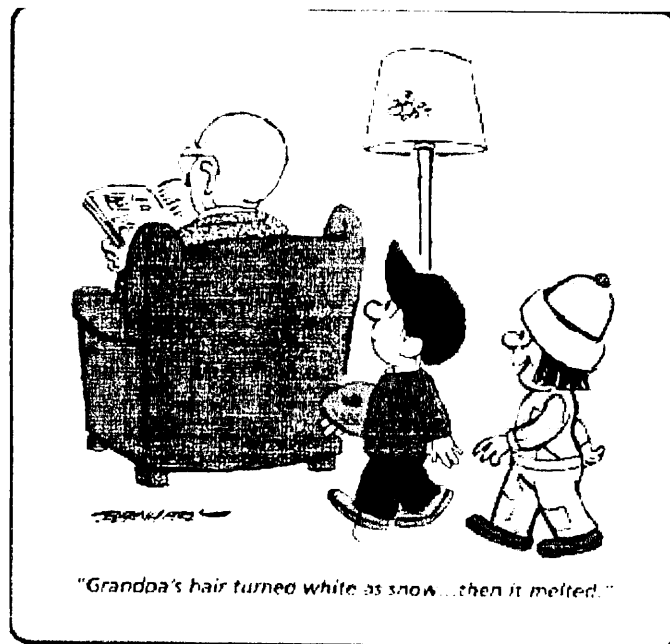
I don't know when you started your journey from near the foot of Cumberland Mountain, below Beersheba Springs, but your life has been useful- you have carried millions of logs made into rafts to the saw mills to be cut into lumber- you furnished fish to everyone who cared to dig the worms for bait, without fear of an officer popping out of nowhere to inspect our license- you amble along for miles between high stone cliffs on one side and fertile fields on the other- you, in times past, furnished the water for weekly washings, where the wash pot and bathing bench set on your grassy, shaded banks.

The swimming hole was in many places along your route, also the Baptismal font for many people starting out in the religious life.

But you were not always in this quiet placid mood- sometimes you would get into a rampageous tantrum and take everything within your reach into your muddy, turbulent embrace. As you receded you would leave your ill-gotten possessions in tops of bushes or against drifts out on land.

You have never carried the great ships or boasted of your great width or length but in your quiet way you have done your part in an unheralded way.

In Grundy County Death Records, Mrs. Faith LOWE, died 2 Jan 1913, age 87, surviving are sons, John and Jim, of Grundy County, and son, C. A., of Crump, TX.)

GROSS, the son of Losson Henry and Hannah WALKER GROSS. His middle initial "A." probably stood for the name Asa. In 1870, Asa GROSS, 27; Elizabeth, 22; Taylor, 3; Losson, 1. By 1900, these children are added: Bell F., born Nov 1882; John C., born Jun 1885; Prudie E., born Jul 1888; Elijah H., born Feb 1891. Daughter M. Ann may be the Mary who married Ambrose SAVAGE, 24 Feb 1895. In 1910, he is called Jacob A., 35; Mary, 34; Lewis H., 11; Alice, 9; Nellie, 3; Alma, 1. Perhaps the J. Taylor who is 14 in 1880, is the James T., 43 in 1910, with wife, Druciler and children: Lassie, Minnie, Ettie, Albert, Johnie, Bessie and Sarah who is wife of Albert TATE. Prudie married Floyd A. WANNAMAKER, 24 Dec 1907 and in 1910 they have Selva, 5 months old. In Philadelphia Church Cemetery: James A. GROSS, 7 Aug 1842/1 Apr 1930; Elizabeth, 15 Jun 1848/22 Nov 1927.)
- 8/8 Losson Henry GROSS, 61, work in B Smith Shop; Hanner, 55; J. Breckenridge, 21. ("Beersheba Springs - A History" says Lawson Henry was son of John T. and Sarah KILLIAN GROSS, married Hannah Tucker WALKER, daughter of James and Polly CAMPBELL WALKER. Children: James A., 1843; Sarah E., 1845; Margaret, 1847; Mary, 1849; Martha, 1851; John Samuel, 1853. Possible marriages: Mary - Warren KNIGHT, 13 Feb 1878; Martha - J. H. KILLIAN, 20 Feb 1873. Losson Henry, 25 Dec 1817/ 5 Sep 1894, Philadelphia Church Cemetery. Also John S. buried there, 1 Aug 1858/1 Dec 1933.)

From other records: Adam D., 30 Nov 1867/27 Jul 1951; wife, Elizabeth MANSFIELD GROSS, 5 Nov 1869/16 Jan 1948, Hebron Cemetery, Warren County. Jefferson married 1st Mary STIPE, 2nd Nora PATTON. 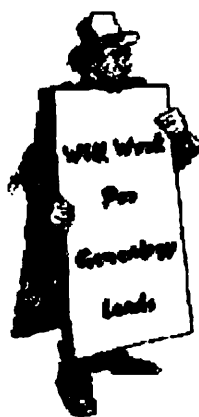

**Women of Grundy County: Nancy Dee Nunley
By Ruth Ann Savage Fults (Great-granddaughter)**

Nancy Dee Nunley was born the eldest child of Frances and Janie Campbell Nunley on the 10th day of December 1879 in Grundy Co., Tennessee. She married William Eli "Jesse" James on the 8th of August 1898. She gave birth to 9 children. Oda Rebecca Jane born November 19, 1899, died July 4, 1893 married Henry Roberts; Minnie Caldonia born June 11, 1901, died December 14, 1975 married Rose Burr Sanders; Albert Malery born January 18, 1904, died November 5, 1973 married Ruby Anderson; William Emmett born July 31, 1906, died March 23, 1962 married Corie Patton; Hasey Ann born April 12, 1909, died February 10, 1910; Marvin Dee born April 12, 1909, died January 24, 1977 married Vinnie Crabtree; Beatrice Lucy born January 18, 1911 married Lawrence Nunley; Laden Columbus born March 27, 1913, died February 8, 1997 married Willie Mae Roberts; and Oma Louise born July 23, 1917 married Jonathan David Higgins and Marion "Soap" McNabb.

Nancy died November 20, 1918, from the flu she contracted while helping take care of those who needed her help and is buried in the Bonny Oaks Cemetery in Coalmont, Tennessee not far from where she lived. She was a very loving mother and dear friend and sister to all who knew her.

Pelham to her parents with her baby son to await the arrival of her new baby, because she could not care for herself and her baby. My father had to work. My Aunt Edna was not married and she quit school to help care for Mother and my brother. Eleven months after my brothers birth, I made my entrance in the world. Everyone thought my mother would be all right after my birth, but it didn't happen. Doctors were baffled as to what had happened. When I was 3 wks & 4 days old, Mother was sent to St. Thomas Hospital in Nashville by train. The doctors there were unable to determine her problem. She remained unable to walk. My other grandparents, Dr. L.A. and Mrs. Mattie Crouch Carden, took my brother to care for. My father remained in Chattanooga.

Billy was brought often for Mother to see, but she could not care for either of us. But from her bed she taught us nursery rhymes and Bible stories. By the time I was three, Mother was some better. She was in a wheel chair most of the time but could walk some with help. She began to teach a Sunday School class. Although money was scarce, she had little special things for the children. Her faith in God was her strength all through the years.

When I was 4 years old, my father came from Chattanooga and asked Mother to get a divorce. He had found someone else and was moving to Philadelphia, PA. In later years, she told me that was such a wonderful time. She loved him so much that being with him, even under the circumstances, was a happy time for her.

Through the years, Mother had many friends, both male and female. Even though she was an invalid, she continued to have many friends. I can remember her old boy friends and girl friends visiting and the happy conversations they had.

One of her former boy friends was her dentist. My Aunt took us to Dechard for my mother to have a tooth pulled and my aunt went on to Winchester. When the dentist pulled her tooth, the root went up into the sinus cavity. He immediately got on the phone to Nashville, put her on a train to a specialist. She couldn't walk without help, but he had someone meet the train and after the root was removed, they put her on the bus with instructions to take her to Pelham and help her onto her aunts house. The bus driver would ask about her health on other trips through Pelham. It seemed she made an impression on everyone she came in contact with.

When I was in high school, Mother fell and broke her hip. She was bed ridden for the remainder of her life, but this did not stop her beautiful smile and sunny attitude.

One morning she called me and said, "My head itches so bad, I think I must have lice." I laughed and told her that was impossible, but the next morning she woke me crying and when I looked at her head, I too was sure she had lice, even though I had never seen them before. It took some doing to rid her of the nasty insects, but after a few days the ordeal was over.

After many days of pondering, we finally figured out how this had happened. She had been teaching a small boy to tell time, and he would lean over on the bed as she taught him.

My grandfather died a few months before my husband, Lewie Winton and I were married. We lived in Cleveland, Ohio for a seventeen months period and then came to Tennessee for the birth of our first daughter, Patricia Adalyn. Lewie took over the duties of the farm and I of a farm wife. We had no electricity or running water. I carried water from the spring for daily laundry and all the other things.

Women of Grundy County: Gladys Alma Conry**By Inez C. Winton**

My mother, Gladys Alma Conry, was the first child born to Edd and Octavia Henson Conry. She was born in Grundy County, on October 28, 1897. Although she did not live to see her 50th birthday (died July 28, 1944), she left an impact on many lives.

Her father Edd was the youngest survivor of the 12 children born to Daniel and Frances Keeling Conry. Daniel was born in Ross Common, Ireland, and migrated to the U.S. in 1849 on the ship "Nestora".

Gladys was a very pretty girl with jet black hair and bright blue eyes. She had two sisters, Marjorie and Edna and a brother, Billy Henson, 20 years her junior. Octavia's ability to do fancy sewing kept her daughters well dressed.

Gladys was a good student and although she lived in Pelham Valley, she attended James K. Shook school and finished in 1915. She was good friends with Naomi Marler, Mary Ellen Hembree, Abbie Metcalf and Katie Goforth.

Gladys first taught school in Cullman, Alabama. She was 18 years old. She rode the train to Cullman and two young men met her. They took her off in a buggy through a cotton field. She said she was scared to death but they deposited her and her luggage at the place she was supposed to board. The people's names were Uselton and they had a country store.

One afternoon, mother went for a buggy ride with a young man. When they neared home, he said, "I'd like some sugar." Mother replied, "I'm sure the store is closed, but if you need sugar, Mr. Uselton will open it up for you."

Another time when she was going home for Christmas, a young man helped her on the train and then leaned down and kissed her. She was very embarrassed but to save face she said, "Take care of the kids while I am gone."

She taught several places in Grundy County. Hobbs Hill and Pelham are two that I remember. Alton Geary said he went to school to her on Hobbs Hill, but it was hard for him to study. He thought she was so pretty he just wanted to look at her. She was teaching in Pelham when she and my father Lynn Abbott Carden were married. She said when she told the children she would no longer be teaching, some of them cried, even the boys.

After marriage, my parents moved to Murfreesboro, TN., so my father could finish his education at MTSU. They boarded with a family, Favor and Ada Jennings and their three children. Mr. Jennings was a local mortician. Some of his people still have the funeral home in Murfreesboro. Mrs. Jennings was a life long friend of my mother. I remember spending a week there when I was a small child. Mrs. Jennings even visited me after Mother died.

My brother, Billy Abbott, was born while they lived in Murfreesboro. When Daddy graduated, they moved to Chattanooga for him to teach.

Things began to go downhill from here. Mother became pregnant very soon after my brother's birth and then she began having trouble walking. She had to go back to

We were a happy hard working family with a big garden and lots of caring. My grandmother and aunt were always busy too.

My aunt had developed a brain tumor, so lots of the time, I had 2 patients and a baby to care for.

On July 17, 1946, my aunt died of an aneurysm. She was only 39 years old. Eleven days later my mother died. It was a very sad time in my life, but my mothers example and outlook on life was very helpful and the faith in God she taught has sustained me through the years. I wish I could be an example to others as she was

When spring comes skipping over the hills

There are numbers of smaller green bordered steams winding their way throughout this tranquil valley. Long stretches of woodland are dotted here and there. Green pastures make a playground for the frolicsome colts and unruly steers. Young calves were bleating and romping in the barnyards while their mothers leisurely nipped the fresh grown grass. The lambs and kids, like soft fleecy balls of white, were

playing leap-frog in the meadows below with an eye single to the wicked old ram. The red rooster flapped his wings on top of the rail fence and crowed with all his might. The hens were cackling from every crevice and corner of the old log barn while the farm wives were busy making new nests of fresh clean straw, for the "Call of Spring" had come. The geese and ducks were floating down Battle Creek chattering to each other, like tiny white specks on the gleam of silver they drifted on and on. The noisy guineas were hallooing, "Potrack, potrack," at the top of their voices. The neighing of horses could be heard from farm to farm. From somewhere up in the valley came the bugle note of the donkey as he reminded his master that it was again hay time. The peacock lifted his gorgeous plumage and lit on the comb of the housetop and strutted in all his pomp and glory. The farmer boy sliced the black soil with his plow, furrow after furrow, thus leaving it turned up to the sun, while he merrily whistled, "Maggie, the cows are coming home," never faltering in his work until his land was finished, when he loosened his traces and left his mules to rest a while.

Across the fence two youngsters were chopping corn stalks, making ready for the plough, at the same time casting sheeps eyes toward the house to see if the coast was clear; with a tomato can they bounded over the fence and scampering over the fresh turned land, they eagerly picked up the long angleworms, and placing them in the tin can with a little earth sprinkled over, armed with a cane pole, a homespun line with a piece of lead for a sinker, barefoot, freckle-faced, hale and hearty, they stealthily made their way to the creekbank--'twas the "Call of Spring." The old mule dozed in the harness while the plow-boy laid in the fence corner with his head pillowed on his coat, his broad brimmed hat pulled over his eyes, basking in the warm sunshine, dreaming of fine crops and a sweet-heart up the creek who he would visit next Sunday.

Fat feather beds and patchwork quilts were hanging on the yard fence that ran around the old farmhouses, more than a century old. The yellow-poplar logs were now brown and dim with age with now and then a modern frame painted snowy white. The housewife came out on the end of the long verandah and placing to her lips the old 'konk shell' she blew long and loud, thus announcing to the farm hands that the hog-jowl, turnip greens, corn pone, scrambled eggs, and cold sweet milk was now waiting; 'twas the "Call of Spring." The soft baby leaves with their crinkled little palms were beckoning the new spring on. Ferns and grasses were shooting up slender blades and unfurling their curious little fronds. The sarvis, the maple, the red bud and the dogwood were splashing against the dark green. Across this landscape I heard the noise and the buzz of wings; like a dark cloud against the clear sky came sweeping over a flock of wild geese, coming home in answer to the "Call of Spring." The fairies were busy from morn till night while the master artist wields his brush with ease and skill and the colors are heaped in stacks by his side. Growing weary of sketching, he cleans his brushes and palette and draws the curtain for the night.

Just as the sun was fading from gold to orange, with a rim of soft red and a tinge of purple, with ribbons of mauve and gray drawn across the primrose sky, he slowly sank behind the hills, and the day was done. With the outlines on the canvas, the willow, the tanglewood and the marshes, the wild flowers, the grape vine, the love vine, the laurel,

butterflies, bees, katydids, fireflies and crickets, sunshine and shadow, must all be woven in between. As the silent hush spreads her long veil of mist over this sleeping valley, the glimmering landscape fades to gloom, a dewdrop nestled close to the heart of the violet as she tenderly folded her blue velvet robes around its quivering form and the two fell asleep, swayed by the cool night breezes.

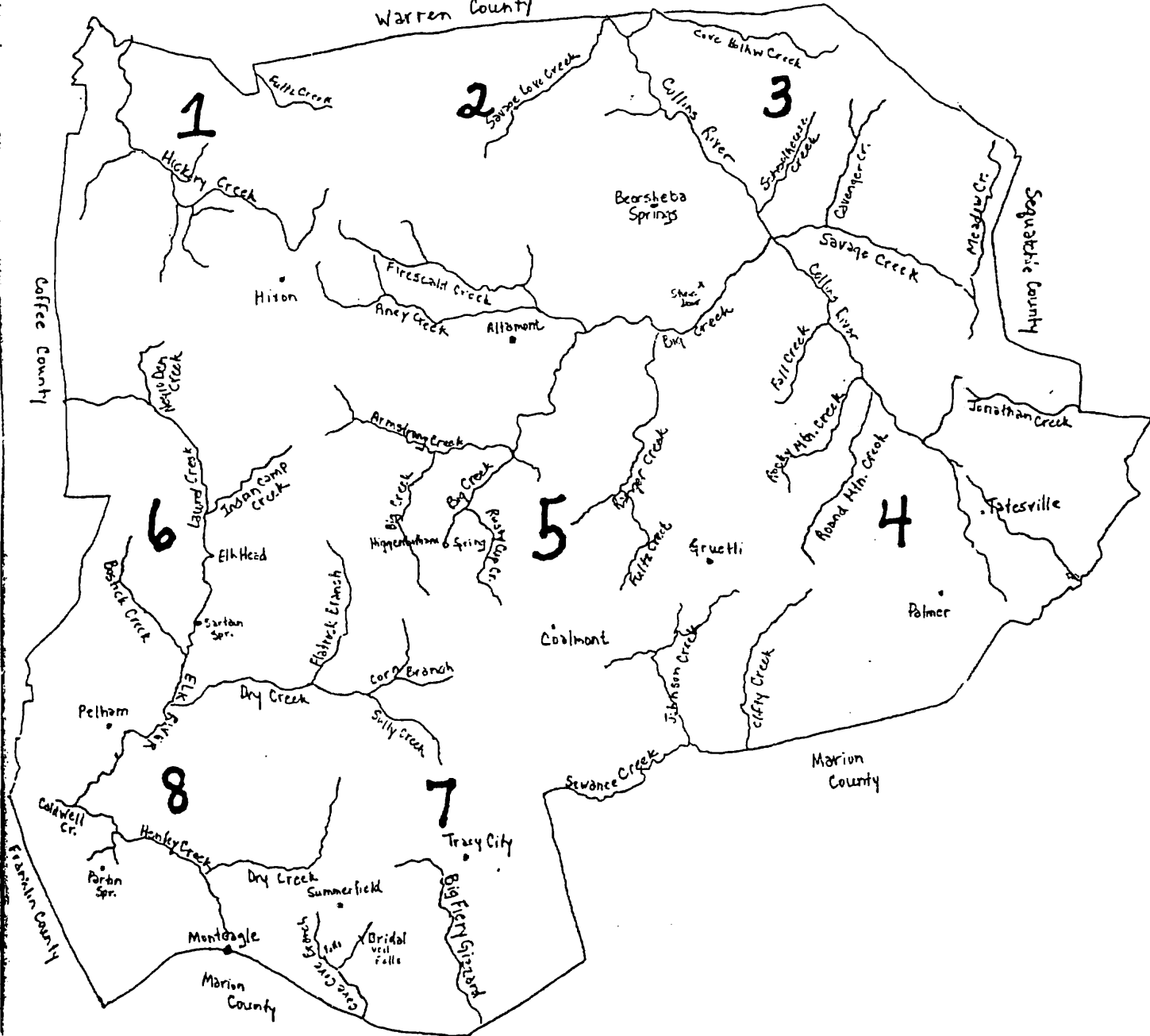

Beersheba & Grundy County Grew Together Records Show

To celebrate Grundy County's beginnings in this statewide Homecoming year, many residents are searching court records for historical information and little-known facts that will add to their community's observance of "who we are and how we got to be that way."

Margaret Coppinger of Beersheba Springs was one of the first Grundy Countians involved with Homecoming '86. Her community began making plans for the event shortly after Gov. Lamar Alexander issued his inaugural invitation for Tennesseans to search their roots, community by community, and find out what each town has that we never want to lose...and take steps to see that we don't.

As long-time historian for the Beersheba Springs area, Margaret already had spent countless hours researching the people and places that make her area unique. She is a member of the historical society which, several years ago, published a Beersheba Springs history.

Mrs. Coppinger and members of the historical society recently began tracking down former residents, like descendants of the family that once owned Savage Gulf, to invite them home for this year's big doings.

She says new street signs have been erected in the town, several mini-parks established, and walking trails through the historic district restored. Residents also are planning a town parade, home tours, and a huge July 4 celebration.

Some of these efforts will remain when the year is past, and could become traditions themselves. One such project is the Beersheba Cain ball planned to honor the town's founder. Mrs. Cain is credited with the discovery, in 1833, of the Chalybeate spring that gave the community a reason for being.

Within a year, her husband had purchased land on the mountain, and erected several log cabins near the bluff. Others followed, and the area was on its way to becoming a booming health resort.

During its early years, Beersheba Springs was part of Warren County. Grundy came into being in May 1844 when surveyors took parts of Warren and Coffee counties (which included land that had been part of Franklin County) to make the new mountain domain. A portion of Marion was added later.

Many residents from Grundy's first communities, those that once were part of other counties, are listed in court records as those instrumental in laying out and providing guidance for the fledgling county. Mrs. Coppinger noticed them recently while researching another matter at the courthouse in Altamont, and thought early court news might be of interest to HERALD readers during this homecoming year. The first installment contains information from January meetings held 1840-1864. Tidbits from February sessions will be printed in February.

JANUARY 1845—The first January meeting of the Grundy County Court was held five months after the county was established, on Jan. 6, 1845. The group met at the home of Jesse Wootten on Cumberland Mountain where they continued to meet for several years. John Burrows was chairman.

The court appointed one man from each of the eight districts to bring lists of taxable property in their respective districts to the April term of court. A road was laid out in Pelham with James Harrison appointed as overseer. James Meeks was appointed for a road from the end of Thomas Sanders' lane to the top of the mountain at Isaac Meeks' property. He would oversee "all the hands in the Sixth and Seventh Districts that are subject to work on the public roads."

Isaac Roberts, A.M. Blair, Daniel Fufts, Noah Bost, William Killon and Jesse Wootten were appointed commissioners to lay off the County of Grundy into common school districts. The court ordered that a tax be levied for county purposes for the year 1845, to wit: 37½ cents on each \$100 worth of property; 10 cents on each jack or stud horse; \$4 on each

merchants license; \$2.50 on each hawkers or peddlers license; \$1 on lawsuits; \$1 on indictments; 10 cents on pleasure carriages; and 10 cents ad valorem on watches and jewelry. Philip Roberts was appointed revenue collector for 1845. David Burrows was elected coroner for two years; Silas J. Roberts, surveyor of Grundy for four years; Barney Burrows, entry taker for four years; and Richard Bradford, ranger.

JANUARY 1846—Very little was done at this meeting except to raise the tax levy to 45 cents per \$100. The high sheriff, Philip Roberts, was allowed \$15.50 for all his services from the first Monday in August 1844 to the first Monday in January 1846.

JANUARY 4, 1847—The tax was changed to 50 cents per \$100, and the ad valorem on watches and jewelry went up to 20 cents.

Acting on a petition from citizens of Collins River, the court ordered a committee be appointed to lay off and mark a road from the Warren County line to intersect the turnpike road at Middle Peak. A large number of workers, both free men and slaves, were assigned to the overseer, Noah Bost.

JANUARY 3, 1848—Trustee John Burrows was allowed \$1 for a book to "keep the record of paying out the school fund." John Wilson was given \$5.39, and Samuel Tate, \$7, for helping with the burial of paupers.

A road was planned for the foot of the mountain in Burroughs Cove to Pelham with William H. Tate as overseer. Elijah Walker was appointed overseer of the Middle Ridge Road "from the foot of the mountain to where it intersects with the road leading from Beersheba to Hunters' Mill."

JANUARY 1, 1849—This meeting was held at the new courthouse in Altamont. Justices appointed Revenue Commissioners for 1849 were Alford Braley of District 1; Richard Stepp, Dist. 2; John Fufts, Dist. 3; William P. Barnes, Dist. 4; William McCraw, Dist. 5; James Sartain, Dist. 6; A.M. Blair, Dist. 7; and David Morley, Dist. 8. Marshall

Fults was bound to John Fults "until he answers to the age of 21." It was ordered by the court that tax on Squire Hunters' land be reduced to 68 $\frac{1}{2}$ cents.

JANUARY 7, 1850—Joseph Vickers and Richard Stepp were elected coroner and ranger, respectively. Both men made bond and took oath. The county tax collector, James Coulson, returned a list of delinquents amounting to \$8.60.

JANUARY 6, 1851—Attending this session were Richard Bradford, William McCraw, Harris Gilliam,

Alfred Braley, John Fults, Carter Scruggs, Richard Stepp, Thomas Warren, Anderson Goodman, Samuel Christian, David Moseley, James E. Reilly, William P. Barnes, Benjamin Roberts and John Dugan.

A road was laid out from the Warren County line to William P. Barnes' gate. Sanders Dykes was appointed overseer "of a road called Middle Ridge in room and stead of John Dykes."

JANUARY 5, 1852—Justices of the quorum who served in 1851 were allowed \$1 for each day served, and "for each day they may serve in 1852." A report was ordered on the possibility of changing the stage road near John Dugan's home.

JANUARY 3, 1853—T.D. Smith asked that \$9 be appropriated to compensate him for furnishing coffins for poor people. A committee was appointed to set apart a year's support for the minor children of B.B. Cunningham, deceased.

JANUARY 1854—The tax for peddling, either in a vehicle or on horseback, was raised to \$10; for exhibiting a slave, \$10; keeping a stallion, \$75; retailing spirits, \$25. Court ordered that \$15 be paid to both Alfred Norris and John Smith, paupers.

JANUARY 1, 1855—New taxes included 25 cents for school purposes and 55 cents for the county on each \$100 worth of property; 2 cents for relief of paupers; \$25 for the privilege of tippling; and \$25 on each hawker or peddler. Samuel Perry, a pauper, was placed in the care of the lowest bidder, Jonathan Scott. Filey Ann, 11, was bound to Elizabeth

Walker until age 18. I.K. Mullins was allowed \$179 for repairing a bridge across the Elk River between Pelham and the mountain. The court ordered that Hills' Turnpike Road be changed to a public road.

JANUARY 7, 1856—No increase in taxes. John J. Crossland and Elisha Crossland were fined \$2 each.

JANUARY 5, 1857—Carter Scruggs was allowed \$52.50 for serving as tax assessor. John Dykes proved in court the killing of a wildcat and was given a certificate. William S. Brown and John G. Tate were allowed \$1.90 "in the way of a release of poll tax as ministers of the gospel to be paid out of any marrying in the county."

JANUARY 4, 1858—Sheriff Samuel Christian was allowed \$93.35 for services rendered. Moses Patrick was named guardian of Wesley Nunley, minor orphan of John Nunley. William S. Brown proved in court the killing of a wildcat and received a certificate.

JANUARY 1859—James Knight was appointed keeper of weights and measures. H.B. Northcutt was named guardian of Beersheba Scott, a minor heir. Stephen Perry made bond for the safekeeping of Samuel Perry, a pauper.

JANUARY 1860—The deputy sheriff, John Hobbs, was ordered to purchase a lock for the courthouse door and "get up all the courthouse chairs and water buckets and keep them locked securely so that no person can carry them away from the Altamont courthouse. William C. Hill was allowed \$33.25 to finish paying for the bridge across Big Creek on the Tracy City road.

JANUARY 1861—F. Marion Walker was appointed guardian for John Stepp. Attending this meeting were Justices William Winton, H.A. Campbell, A. Northcutt, E.H. Smith, Leden Brown, Silas Lankford, Jazeal Tate, Carter Scruggs, A.E. Colston, I.W. Bryant, Elijah Walker, Sanders Dykes, John Winton, S.P. Cope, John W. Hale and G.W. Parks.

JANUARY 1862—Jonathan Scott, administrator of Huel Scott, deceased, appointed a committee to lay out a year's provisions for the widow, Sarah Scott. A.R. Layne was allowed \$3 for making a coffin for William Fults. Jesse Coppinger and Joseph Tate each proved in court the killing of a wildcat.

An oath was prepared as follows: "I do solemnly swear that I will support the constitution of the Confederate States of America. So help me God."

JANUARY 1863—A. Northcutt was appointed guardian of Caldona Bost, Jefferson Bost, Rachel Bost and William Whitman, minor heirs of Noah Bost.

JANUARY 1864—Minutes taken at this meeting were the last until July 1865. The skirmish between federals and confederates took place in Tracy City on Jan. 20, 1864. **JANUARY 1866**

—A committee named to lay off a year's supply for Elizabeth Bryant and family of nine suggested: 75 bushels of corn, 20 bushels of wheat, 1,000 pounds of pork, \$30 worth of cotton, \$30 for coffee, 100 pounds of sugar, 300 pounds of lard, and \$20 for shoe leather. It totaled \$395 for the year.

John J. Walker, who was responsible for three colored children bound to him some years earlier, was released from his obligation as "said free colored children had run away from him during the rebellion."

William C. Smith, H.B. Northcutt, J.M. Bouldin, John Scruggs and Robert Sanders were elected trustees for Altamont Academy. A number of other men were appointed guardians of widows or minor children, and overseers of local roads as the county court got back in full swing following the war.

In the early 1830's some Franklin County residents desired to be cut off and made into another county which was to be named Jones County. It was to be created from Warren & Franklin Counties only and was to include the headwaters of the Elk and its watershed. This county never came to be, however, citizens in the extreme northeastern part of Franklin County (Elk River Valley) petitioned to become a part of Coffee County in Oct. 1837, giving reasons of being remotely situated from Winchester and consequently subject to much inconvenience and expense in attending courts and in transacting ordinary business there. They proposed this territory to be annexed into Coffee County: Beginning at the Southeast corner of the said Coffee County near Isaac Street's on the Winchester & McMinnville Stage Road thence to the foot of Cumberland Mountain to the Marion County line - thence with the Marion County line to the Warren County line - thence with the Warren County line to the Coffee County line - thence with the lines of said Coffee County to the Beginning embracing the settlements on the head of Elk River - for which as in duty bound we will ever pray. (original spellings used)

BELL'S COVE

The name Bell's Cove comes from an early settler, Harriss Bell, whose son built and operated a water powered grist-mill on Elk River near where Elston and Shelby (Henley) Clay now live. The 1850 census of Grundy County shows Harriss, age 27; his wife, Rachel, 24; William O., 5; Margaret J., 2. By 1860, to his family had been added Robert L., 10; John, 8; and Mary M., 1. Living with the family was Jesse Laxon, 65.

According to Jim Scott, who is 105 years old, Frank Bell built Bell's Mill. Jim tells of Frank Bell, the miller, and of his boys, Charles and Sumner Bell, both of whom were fine singers who led church congregations respectively at Chapman's Chapel and at Pelham Methodist Church in their Sunday morning praises to the Lord. Sumner became a second generation miller. From time to time others were hired to run the mill. Among them were Willie Partin and Henderson Bennett. Mr. Scott related that the mill burned twice, but that it had been rebuilt each time.

The old mill finally closed in the mid 1930's when Sumner Bell was killed in a tractor accident. Over the years, piece by piece, the mill was torn away and now there is only the concrete base and the name, "Bell's Mill", to remind us of the once thriving business and of the Bell family.

Harriss Bell and his family lived in a house near present day Partin Spring which was subsequently purchased by Columbus Partin, then passed on down to Bryan and Emma (Bramblett) Partin who lived in it until it burned in the late 1970's. The house was said to have been built by a man whose name has long since been forgotten. Taylor Partin tells of a cave which goes straight down into the ground near the entrance of Trussell Cave. On the wall at the very back of that cave is inscribed the house builder's name and the date, 1831.

On the farm of Alice (Gilliam) Womack near the home of Homer & Arlene Layne is the old Harriss Bell Cemetery.

TENNESSEE LAWS ESTABLISHING AND CHANGING THE BOUNDARIES OF GRUNDY COUNTY

As Found In:

The Land Laws of Tennessee ... by Henry D. Whitney (Cincinnati: W.H. Anderson & Co., 1893).

1844 - Chapter 204. AN ACT to establish the county of Grundy. - Passed Jan. 29.

Section 1. *Be it enacted, etc.*, That a new county be, and the same is hereby established, by taking a part of the counties of Warren and Coffee, to be known and designated by the name of Grundy, in honor of the Honorable Felix Grundy, deceased.

Sec. 2. That the beginning corner of the county of Grundy shall commence in the center of the stage road leading from McMinnville, where the Coffee County line crosses the same; thence a southwardly direction, so as not to approach Manchester nearer than twelve miles, until near Benjamin Douglass'; thence eastwardly up the mountain to the top; thence with the meanders of the bluffs to the line of District No. 13, in Coffee County; thence with said line to the line of Franklin County; thence east with said line to James Petty's, near the foot of Cumberland Mountain; thence with the said line to the line of Warren County; thence with the line of Warren County, to the line of Van Buren County; thence west with said line to the corner of Jesse Savage's; thence round the bluffs of Hill's Creek, so as not to approach nearer the town of McMinnville than twelve miles, to a point on the road leading to the Beersheba Springs, twelve miles southeast of McMinnville; thence westwardly crossing the mountains, so as to keep twelve miles from McMinnville, to a point near Jesse Fults; thence westwardly passing between John Brown, Esq., and William Roton's; thence a direct line to the beginning; said lines in no case to approach nearer than twelve miles of the town of McMinnville and Manchester.

1854 - Chapter 134. AN ACT to attach a portion of Coffee County to the county of Grundy. - Passed Jan. 30.

Section 1. *Be it enacted, etc.*, That so much of the county of Coffee as is hereinafter designated, be and the same is hereby attached to the county of Grundy, viz: Beginning on the top of the Cumberland Mountain, on the Grundy County line; thence west down the old Bush Gap Ridge to the old Coffee County line; thence with the old Coffee line to Street's old place; thence to the mouth of Bradley's Creek; thence up Elk River to a stake on the south side of said river; thence to the Grundy County line; so as to include the territory taken off the county of Franklin, in the year 1837, and annexed to the county of Coffee, and the line that divided Franklin County and Coffee County now be the dividing line between Coffee County and Grundy County, and that all officers both military and civil, hold their offices until others are elected.

1850 - Chapter 70. AN ACT to change the line between the counties of Grundy and Warren, and for other purposes. - Passed Feb. 2.

Section 1. *Be it enacted, etc.*, That William Kelton, Wilson S. Kelton, Ely Hanby [*sic*] and Jacob Wagoner, be and they are hereby detached from the county of Grundy, and attached to the county of Warren, with their lands and tenements, with all the rights and privileges of other citizens of the county of Warren.

Sec. 2. That the line of Coffee and Grundy be and is so altered as to include the lands of William C. Williamson, in the county of Coffee.

Sec. 4. That the county line between the counties of Warren and Grundy be so changed and altered as to include the lands of Elizabeth Tate, wife of the late James Tate, deceased, Peter Countis and Jacob Warmamaker [*sic*], in Grundy County, with all the rights and privileges of other citizens of the county of Grundy, thence to the line known as Robert's line, and the said line is hereby established between the counties of Warren and Grundy.

Sec. 5. That Thomas Johnson be, and he is hereby attached to the county of Grundy.

1852 - Chapter 262. AN ACT to alter and change the line between the counties of Smith and DeKalb, and for other purposes. - Passed Feb. 2.

Sec. 2. That the line between the counties of Grundy and Sequatchie be changed as follows, to-wit: Beginning at a stake in the line between said counties at a point south of the Brener place, at the head of the east prong of Collin's River, running thence a direct line to said Brener place, including the same in said county of Sequatchie; thence down with the said east prong of said river to James W. Tate's place, including the same in said county of Sequatchie; thence with the base of the ridge west of said river northwardly around to the Widow Wright's residence; thence a direct line to the Little Jake Cagle old place, now occupied by James Cagle, including the same in Sequatchie County; thence with said road in the direction of Hill's Creek to where the Grundy and Warren County lines cross the same; thence with the Grundy County line eastwardly to the Grundy and Sequatchie County corner.

1858 - Chapter 83. AN ACT requiring survey to be made before any change shall hereafter be made in any county line, and for other purposes. - Passed March 20.

Sec. 4. ... *And be it further enacted*, that the line between the counties of Warren and Grundy, be so changed or altered as to include the whole of the farm and residence of Wyatt M. Humble in Warren County, and that he be entitled to all the rights and privileges of other citizens of Warren County.

1873 - Chapter 73. AN ACT to change the county line between the counties of Grundy and Coffee. - Passed March 21; approved Dec. 24.

Section 1. *Be it enacted, etc.*, That the boundary line between the counties of Grundy and Coffee be so changed as to run as follows: Commencing at the north-west corner of Grundy County, on the stage road leading from McMinnville to Hillsboro, near Michael Hoover's house, running eastwardly with the Warren County line so as to take in M. Hoover's Martin tract of land, and the lands upon which Henry Meadows, J.C. Garritson, T.J. and William Garritson, James Parks, E. Rives, T.E. Rives, T.E. Mabery, G. Brawley, T.G. England, James Rhea, John Rhea, James Hoover, Andrew Stalls, A. Anthony, Wm. H. Garritson, W.H.H. Meadows, E.H. Rives, James Parks, J.W. Walker, J.B. Thaxton and Jos. Brawley, and that all of said persons and lands are hereby detached from the county of Grundy and attached to the county of Coffee; and it shall be the duty of the County Court of Grundy County to order an election to be holden in said portion of Grundy County, said election to be held and governed according to law, as other elections are held, but it shall require a two-thirds vote of said qualified voters before this act shall take effect; *Provided, further*, that nothing in this act shall be so construed as to reduce Grundy County below its constitutional limits, nor bring the line thus designated nearer the court house of Grundy County than eleven miles.

1877 - Chapter 131. AN ACT to change the line between the counties of Coffee and Grundy. - Passed March 26; approved March 26.

Section 1. *Be it enacted, etc.*, That the line between the counties of Coffee and Grundy be so changed as to include the lands of Ewell Smith, in the county of Coffee, beginning on a rock on the Coffee and Grundy line, thence south 84°, east with W.H. Willis' line to James H. Patton's line, thence with said line south 6° east, to a rock pile, James H. Patton's corner, thence south 83 1/2° west to Coffee County line.

1879 - Chapter 235. AN ACT to change the lines between the counties of Franklin, Coffee and Grundy. - Passed March 28, approved March 31.

Section 1. *Be it enacted, etc.*, That the lines between the counties of Franklin, Coffee and Grundy, at their intersection on Elk River, be changed as follows, to-wit: Beginning at a stake in the line between Coffee and Grundy, twenty yards north of Elk River, and running thence west to the north end of the bridge crossing Elk River; thence with the center of said bridge to the south end of said bridge; thence to a stake in the old line, fifteen yards south of said river, so as to place the said bridge on the lines between said counties of Coffee, Franklin and Grundy.

1881 - Chapter 107. AN ACT to change the county line between the counties of Franklin and Grundy

1891 - Chapter 143. AN ACT to be entitled an act to change the line between the counties of Franklin, Marion and Grundy. - Passed March 13; approved March 18.

Section 1. *Be it enacted, etc.*, That the line between the counties of Franklin, Marion and Grundy be changed to run as follows, to-wit: Beginning at what is known as Drip Spring, south of the railroad on the line between Franklin and Marion, and running east to Fred. Myers' spring, thence northeastward across the railroad to Bazil Summers' chalybeate spring in Grundy County, thence west along the north bluff of the mountain to the line between Franklin and Grundy Counties, north of the railroad.

1891 - Chapter 214. AN ACT to change the line between Grundy and Franklin Counties. - Passed March 30; approved March 30.

Section 1. *Be it enacted, etc.*, That the line between Grundy and Franklin Counties be so changed as to include the lands on which J.F. Laxson now lives in the county of Grundy.

Coffee County approved the annexation of this area of Franklin County, and an election was held in Pelham on 3 Feb 1838. A list of the voters follows;

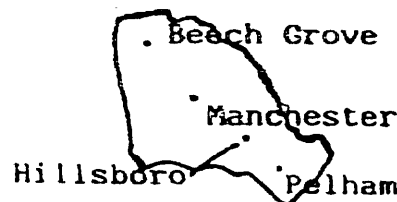

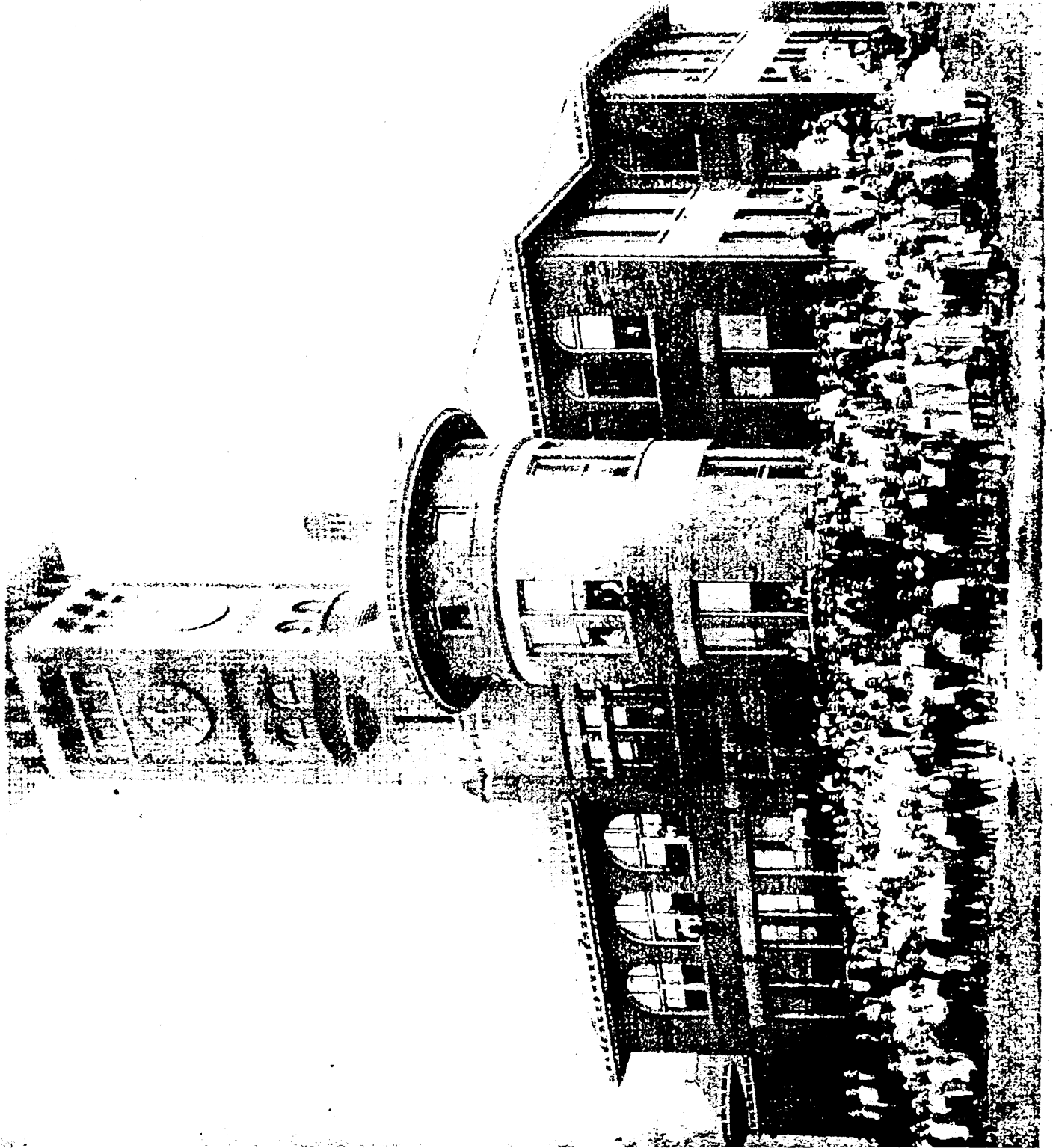
